Trix's Discoveries: Evolving from Old to New Signs

She noticed that a lot of interpreters continue to use outdated signs without thinking about changes and signs that represent what we actually use right now; Trix has put together a fascinating workshop offering updated signs.

This information has been gleaned from various schools. There will be several opportunities for hands-on practice.
